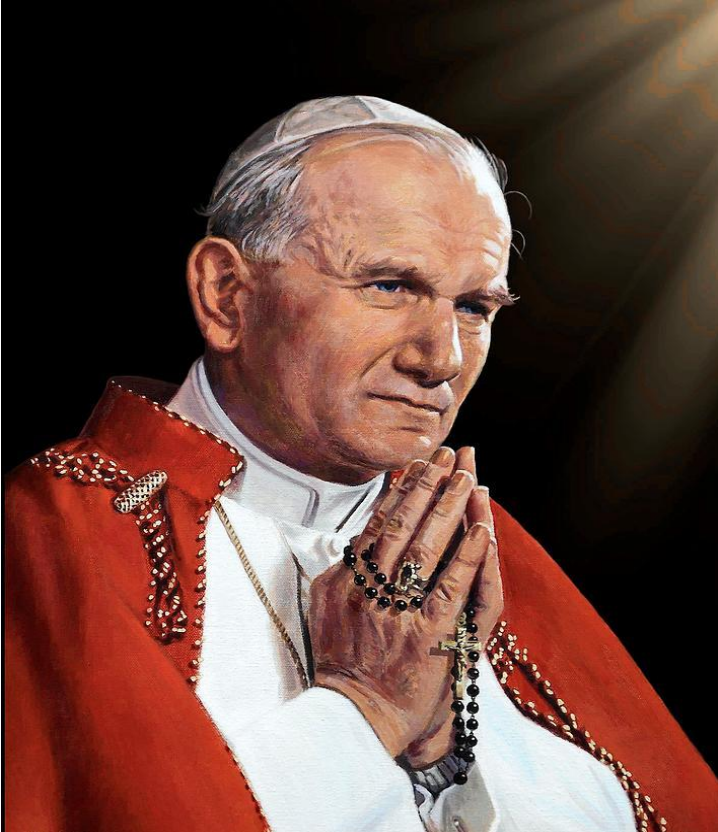
## STUDENT CHARTER

## CITIZENS FORUM

### YUVAKSHETRA INSTITUTE OF MANAGEMENT STUDIES

#### FUNDAMENTAL RIGHTS OF INDIAN CITIZENS

Right to Equality (Articles 14-18)

Article 14 : Equality before law. The State shall not deny to any person equality before the law or the equal protection of the laws within the territory of India

Article 15 : Prohibition of discrimination on grounds of religion, race, caste, sex or place of birth

Article 16 : Equality of opportunity in matters of public employment

Article 17 : Abolition of untouchability

Article 18 : Abolition of titles

Right to Freedom (Articles 19-22)

Article 19 : Protection of certain rights regarding freedom of speech, etc.

(1) All citizens shall have the right-

- (a) to freedom of speech and expression;
- (b) to assemble peaceably and without arms;
- (c) to form associations or unions;
- (d) to move freely throughout the territory of India;
- (e) to reside and settle in any part of the territory of India; and
- (f) to practice any profession, or to carry on any occupation, trade or business.

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Article 20 : Protection in respect of conviction for offenses

Article 21 : Protection of life and personal liberty

Article 21A : Right to education

Article 22 : Protection against arrest and detention in certain cases

Right Against Exploitation (Articles 23-24)

Article 23 : Prohibition of traffic in human beings and forced labour

Right to Freedom of Religion (Articles 25-28):

Article 25 : Freedom of conscience and free profession, practice and propagation of religion

Article 28 : Freedom as to attendance at religious instruction or religious worship in certain educational institutions

Cultural and Educational Rights (Articles 29-30):

Article 29 : Protection of interests of minorities

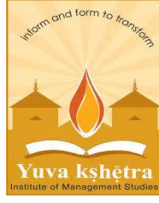
Article 30 : Right of minorities to establish and administer educational institutions

Right to Constitutional Remedies (Article 32):

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## THE COLLEGE EMBLEM

Asato Maa Sad Gamaya

Tamaso Maa Jyotir-Gamaya

Mrtyor-Maa Amrtam Gamaya (Brihadaranyaka Upanishads, 1.3.28)

The Indian prayer of Tamaso Maa Jyotir-Gamaya, (Lead me from the darkness to light) which is known as the “santhi mantra” in the Vedic and Upanishadic tradition, is the core of the message of the emblem of Yuvakshetra Institute of Management Studies. “Ignorance is darkness and erudition is light”. The name *Yuvakshetra* is the combination of two Sanskrit words ‘yuva’ and ‘kshetra’. The word yuva means youth or a young human being and kshetra means a holy place or a gathering place. So the name *Yuvakshetra* signifies a holy gathering place of the young people. The book signifies three exposures; First and foremost it stands for the Holy Bible which is the source of eternal wisdom and in the second part the book stands for all the written works of wisdom and knowledge in the world and in the third part it means the book of life of each teacher from which the students learn many things. There are two flames coming from the book of wisdom; one is big and the other is small. The big flame stands for the infinite, eternal and perennial wisdom that comes from God and the small flame stands for the finite wisdom and knowledge that human being acquire through their hard work and studies. The big flame also stands for the teachers who enlighten the students and the small flame stands for the students who are enlightened through the teaching of the teachers. On either sides of the flame there are two towers that signify the tower of Confidence and the tower of Perseverance. It means that the wisdom and knowledge become enriched only in the context of confidence and perseverance.

The motto “Inform and form to transform” throws light into the very existence of Yuvakshetra. The knowledge we impart to the students about the natural and supernatural values and ethical principles together with the curriculum shape the physical, emotional, spiritual, social, intellectual and curricular dimensions along with their mind, intellect, behavior and professional personality. Thus we try to transform them to be better citizens, job candidates, persons of values, and lovers of nature. The radiance of rays shown in the emblem indicates that a person transformed in such a way envisaged by Yuvakshetra Institute of Management Studies will carry out light around him in the society. Imbibing the words of Jesus who said “I am the light of the world” (Jn. 8, 12), the students who are enlightened with the spiritual and secular wisdom, become capable of enlightening the world in and around.



## **GREEN PROTOCOL**

- **Bring food only as per requirement to avoid wastage**
- **Use ink pens to prevent accumulation of plastic waste through the discarded ball point pens**
- **Food and drinking water should be brought in stainless steel utensils and disposable materials should be avoided**
- **Use waste bins provided in the campuses and segregate waste into bio- degradable, non-bio degradable and hazardous categories**
- **Avoid paper and plastic cups and plates in public functions for serving food. Instead, use utensils that can be washed and reused**
- **All departments to deposit waste paper only in the common Materials Recovery Facility in the campus**

- **Constitute Green Protocol teams for monthly monitoring of activities. Class leaders and Teachers be trained by Suchitwa Mission on ways of Greening**

## **FACILITIES**

### **‘BODHI’– THE LIBRARY**

The College library was established in the year 2005 with a view to preserve and disseminate knowledge to the academic communities. The library has vast collections of books, national-international journals, magazines, periodicals, dissertations, project reports etc. and also well equipped with online databases like N List- INFLIBNET DELNET, NDL, NPTEL, other e- resources etc. Library operations are fully automated with Koha Integrated Library System software with automated Gate Register. Online web OPAC system is used for the searching of library resources. Books are being arranged according to the Dewey Decimal Classification System. Admission to the library, in general, is reserved only for students & Staff of YIMS. Library has two sections; the main section is for all students whereas the second section is exclusively for Hotel Management students.

### **GENERAL RULES**

- a. The library will remain opened from 8.30 AM to 5:00 PM on all working days.
- b. Library members should mark their entry (In/Out) in the e-gate machine, which is kept at the entrance of the library.
- c. Books, handbags and other personal belonging must be kept outside/property counter before entering the library.
- d. Members are requested to observe strict silence in the library and its surroundings.
- e. Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) system is followed in the library. Users can check the books availability in the catalogue.

- f. Members should not alter the arrangement of books/journals in theracks section. If any item is taken out from the rack, it should be placed back correctly or left on the side of rack or table.
- g. Members must handle the books/ journals with care; marking withpencil/pen, writing or highlighting, tearing the pages or mutilating the same in any other way will be viewed very seriously and a fine will be imposed.

### REFERENCE BOOKS AND JOURNALS

- 1. Reference books and journals shall not be taken out of the library. These can be read only in the reading room.
- 2. Members who wish to read the reference books must enter their names, batch, course etc. in the library software and the book issued to them for reading inside the library.
- 3. For journals, a periodical usage register is kept in the library andwrite the details of the members and journals must be entered inthe respective columns.

### CIRCULATION SYSTEM

- 1. Books are issued to the students after verifying the ID cards. The member must produce his/her ID card when a book is issued.
- 2. Books issued to the respective category of library are:

3. Before leaving the library, borrowers must examine the books taken by them and if any mutilation or defect is found, it must be brought to the notice of the librarian. The borrowers will be responsible for any damage or mutilation detected thereafter.
4. The librarian may reduce the period of loan if the book is very much in demand.
5. Reissue of books to a borrower may be allowed maximum twice other than the first issue.
6. When a book is issued to a member, the due date for the return of the book will be noted in the due slip attached to the book.
7. Librarian may recall any book from any member at any time and the member must return the same immediately.
8. Books must be returned on or before the due date. If the day happens to be a holiday, the book must be returned on the very next working day. For retaining the book beyond the due date of return, library member will have to pay an overdue charge of Rs.5 per day.
9. If the books are lost, the borrower shall replace the book or deposit three times the price of the book in the library.
10. All batches of students are strictly advised to follow their allotted library hours. "No Due Certificate" must be obtained from the Librarian to get the examination hall ticket and for other purposes like discontinuation certificate, T.C etc.

## **RULES AND GUIDELINES FOR LIBRARY DIGITAL INFORMATION AND INTERNET USE**

1. Use of the YIMS Bodhi library's computers is purely for academic purposes and on a walk-in basis. Time limit on these computers is 30 minutes if another person is waiting.
2. All persons using the Internet must enter the details in the internet usageregister kept in the library.
3. Personal software programs may not be installed on the library's computers. Changes may not be made to the setup or configuration of the software or hardware.
4. Internet Browsing, Downloading, Printing, Scanning of information are fee-based services which complies with the Copyright Law and laws relating to the use of the Internet and other electronic media.
5. Misuse or abuse of the library's computers will result in suspension of privileges.
6. Allotment of computers is at the discretion of the library staff.

### **COMPUTER LAB**

Yuvakshetra maintains a sophisticated computer lab. Individual access is ensured and the students get experience in the lab. The lab is open for the students even after the college hours. The computer terminals are connected with Local Area Network (LAN). High performance processors and latest authorized software's are made available. PG students can use their Laptops.

### **LAB RULES**

- Timing of Lab 9.30 am to 5.00 pm from Monday to Friday.
- Entry to the lab is permitted only with Student Identity Card.
- Strict silence should be maintained in the lab.
- Students must make proper entries in the lab register before and after working in the lab.

- Students are accompanied with the Mentors assigned for respective hour.
- The systems must be handled carefully. Improper use of computers is punishable. Do not install any software in lab.
- Ensure that the systems are properly shutdown after use.
- The chairs should be placed in the proper position after use. Dragging of chairs must be avoided. Keep the lab neat and clean.
- Students are not permitted to play computer games in the lab. Software other than the ones prescribed in the syllabus may be used only with permission of the faculty.
- Proper order and discipline should be maintained in the lab. Students are not permitted to roam in the lab.
- Students are not permitted to use any CD or Pen Drives in the system, without getting prior permission from the System Administrator.
- Viewing of non recommended or unethical (Pornography, child abuse, etc.) sites by a student may result in expulsion from the computer lab permanently.
- No social networking sites are permitted to be operated in the computer lab.

### **FRONT OFFICE - LAB**

The students are trained in aspects of reception, billing, cashiering, book keeping, complaint handling etc.

### **TRAINING RESTAURANT AND MOCK BAR**

The training restaurants in the institute are replicas of hotel restaurants. The training restaurant offers a simulated effect with the furniture and fixtures.

### **FOOD AND BEVERAGE PRODUCTION LAB**

The food production labs (Basic, Quantity and Advanced) are well setup with all state-of-the-art equipment required for a real hotel kitchen. International techniques and high standards of hygiene in food handling are maintained here.

The institute has 9 mock guest rooms which are a version of the guestrooms available in the star hotels.

## **LAUNDRY AND LINEN**

All aspects of laundry operation are taught here, whereby, the students master different housekeeping operations.

## **CHAPEL**

Holy Mass is celebrated in the chapel on First Friday of every month. Attendance in the mass is compulsory for Catholic Students. Other Christian students are also encouraged to attend the Mass. The chapel is open on all days.

## **AUDIO-VISUAL ROOM**

It enables the students the latest educational videos on various topics. They are supposed to present their assignments, projects and classes with the help of LCD Projector and home theater.

## **“SYMPHONY”- THE AUDITORIUM**

The institute has a spacious auditorium with a capacity to seat 400 in theatre style. The college assembly for Hotel Management conducted here on all Tuesdays at 9:25AM. All the students are expected to be present for the assembly. Other special functions and cultural activities are also held in the auditorium.

## **CHRIST HILL AUDITORIUM**

The institute has a spacious auditorium with a capacity to seat 1200 persons. The college assembly for Arts and science students is conducted here on all Monday at 9.25Am. All the students are expected to be present for the assembly. Other special functions and cultural activities are also held in this auditorium.

### **SOPHIA THEATRE**

The college is equipped with an air conditioned hall with a capacity to seat 110 in a theatre style. All the major conferences, seminars etc, are conducted in this hall.

### **'CAFÉYU-COURT'-CANTEEN**

Light refreshments and meals are provided in the canteen for the staff and students. The cafeteria also provides snacks and light drinks.

### **GAMES AND SPORTS**

Recreational facilities are provided to the students for their physical as well as mental development. Special coaching is given for Basketball, Football and Volley ball. Sports requirements can be obtained from the Physical Education Department.

### **HOME OF LOVE - THE HOSTEL**

Separate hostels are run for boys and girls. The male students are accommodated in the hostel located in the campus which are directly under the guidance of the Management. Hostel facilities are provided for boys under the supervision of Rev. Fathers and for girls under that of Rev. Sisters.

The health and safety of students are of paramount importance to us and there will be no presumption of death or negligence with respect to this. For the students to stay fit and healthy, college hostel is equipped with a gymnasium. It is opened both in the morning and evening hours and can be used by the students and staff.

## **CCTV**

The college is under the surveillance of CCTV. Cameras are fixed in the classrooms and in corridors. It is not to curtail the freedom of any one - instead it is meant to maintain discipline, decorum and peaceful atmosphere in the campus.

## **MORAL CLASS**

## **STUDENT COUNSELLING**

An expert counselor is available for guidance and counseling for the students. Expert counsellors from the Department of Psychology are also available for students with the permission of Principl/Vice Principal

## **PLACEMENT CELL**

Yuvakshetra assures excellent placement opportunities for eligible students of all streams. The first batch of Arts and science stream passed out in the academic year 2015. Off campus placement drive for the students from various graduate streams was conducted in the year 2014 onwards. The college is conducting placement drives every year. Around 200 students get placed with reputed institutions like Infosys, Wipro, ESAF, HDFC and many more through campus placement drives conducted by the College every year. Students are also given orientations to participate in other off- campus placement programme conducted in and around the state. Majority of the students get placements to technical position with the opportunity for higher education.

Exclusive field work and training programs are being provided to students of all streams especially Hotel Management to help them get placement in reputed institutions. Every year Department of Hotel Management students placed in different properties like Jumeirah, meydan, IHG, THE WESTIN, etc conduct campus drive in association with different MNC's in which the students of Yuvakshetra can also participate.

## **CRITERIA FOR THE SELECTION OF STUDENTS FOR TRAINING AND PLACEMENT**

- The student should have ensured 80% attendance.
- He/She should have passed all the internal examinations conducted by the college.
- Violation of rules and regulations of the college (which are archived in the Student's Integral Assessment Record- SIAR and kept with Vice Principal/ Department) shall be considered as a qualifying element in considering a student's candidacy for training and placement.
- The Hotel Management students will be allowed to attend Only four interviews, to ensure selection to the firm or organization concerned that conducts campus recruitment.

## **ANTI - RAGGING AND REDRESSAL CELL**

Anti-Ragging Cell will be the supervisory and cell committee in preserving the cultural of ragging free environment. Anti- Ragging Committee will be involved in designing strategies and action plan for curbing the menace of ragging in the college by adopting array of activities. ### **(ii) KERALA RAGGING PROHIBITION ACT 1998**

For the information of the students and their parents, the pertinent parts from the Kerala Ragging Prohibition Act published in 1998, forbidding ragging in the educational institutions of Kerala are quoted below.

(2b) By Ragging, it is meant any physical or mental torture or any disorderly conduct towards any student of an educational institution causing apprehension, dread, humiliation or agitation in him / her.

1. It can be any harassment like insulting, teasing, bullying or manhandling.
2. It can also be forcing upon him / her to do something which he/she voluntarily won't dare to do normally.
3. Prohibition of Ragging: Ragging is prohibited both inside and outside an educational institution.
4. Punishment for Ragging: Any student involved in ragging/ persuades others for ragging or advocates ragging either inside or outside an educational institution shall be subject to a punishment of not more than two years imprisonment in addition to a penalty of not over Rs. 10,000.
5. Dismissal of a Student: A student subject to the punishment under section (4) is liable to be dismissed from the institution and is barred from being admitted to any other institution for a period of three years from the date of receipt of his / her dismissal order.
6. Suspension of a Student: If a student / parent / guardian or any teacher of the institution forwards a written complaint to the head of the institution, he has to make an urgent enquiry into the matter within 7 days of receipt of such a complaint. If the

allegation is proved to be correct, the accused must be suspended with immediate effect and the matter must be referred to the police for further proceedings.

7. As is said in sub-section 1, if a written complaint is received by the head of the institution, he has to make a detailed enquiry and if it is found baseless, the complainant must be informed of it in writing.
8. Abetting: If the head of the institution refuses to take action in the manner described under section 6 or is negligent in initiating any steps, he is to be treated as one abetting the crime and is liable to be punished under section 4.

### **DISCIPLINARY ACTION COMMITTEE**

Under the supervision of the Principal, Vice Principal and all HODs, the college has an Ethics and Disciplinary Action Committee. The Committee is in charge of ensuring proper behaviour of academic body in the campus and taking decisions on the violation of rules and regulations, including suspension or dismissal from the college.

### **ACADEMICS**

- The College begins the day with a prayer / prayer song (with assembly on Monday/Tuesday)
- Classes will begin at 9.30 am and end by 3:30 pm. Students are expected to be in the class by 9.25 am. The college gate will remain closed till 3.30 pm. If any student needs to go out with any serious reason, he/she needs to get permission from their department and should get a gate pass from college office.
- Students will not be permitted within the college building after office hours without permission, except in the library, if the librarian is available
- All fees and dues payable must be remitted to the office on or before the stipulated dates with Demand Draft, failing which fine will be levied and the student may not be permitted to attend classes or appear for examinations. Fee once paid are not refundable.
- Online Payment facility is available for students to pay their fees.
- Campus is Smoking Free Zone and Plastic Free Zone.
- Each student must be punctual for assembly, theory classes, practical classes, assignments, submission of projects and attend

- to any other duties assigned, with whole hearted commitment.
- Attendance for tests and examinations are compulsory.
  - Late comers will not be admitted to the classroom without permission from the Principal/Vice Principal.
  - If a student is absent at the beginning of any class, he/she will be marked absent for half day.
  - A student requiring leave must apply for it in advance in the prescribed leave form which can be obtained from the college store. Except for grave reasons leave will not be sanctioned.
  - A student requiring leave for a particular hour/s must inform the mentor-in-charge of that particular period in person before the class begins.
  - But if a student requires leave for more than one period he/she must submit a leave letter to the Vice Principal/Principal through the Head of The Department.
  - Leave letters must be attested by the warden in the case of inmates of the hostel and by the parent/guardian in the case of day scholar and sent on time.
  - Absence without leave is considered a breach of discipline and any leave taken without proper sanction will be liable for disciplinary action.
  - Submission of leave application does not imply granting of leave. Leave can be taken only if the authority concerned has sanctioned it. Leave will be granted depending on the priority of the case.
  - A student who applies for long leave on grounds of illness must produce a Medical certificate along with his/her application.
  - Attendance is obligatory in the college. A candidate must have 80% of attendance per semester to attend the semester examination. Necessary exemption may be given for absence on medical ground.
  - Students are not permitted to take leave for visiting other student's home on working days any ground without the prior permission of the Vice Principal /Principal.
  - In case of absenteeism the SMS alert will be sent to the parents mobile. It is necessary to inform the change in mobile number to the college for better communication.

## DISCIPLINE

- The medium of instruction, examination and communication will be in English. Students must speak in English language in the Campus. Thegrooming standard is compulsory for all students with respect to uniform, personal grooming, hygiene etc. Uniform should be worn on all working days, all functions. Inattentiveness and indifference towards any subject, discourtesy towards any staff member or outsider, if affect the discipline of the college will be viewed seriously
- Every student on admission must obtain an identity card and the Student handbook from the office after the payment of the prescribedfee. The identity card must be worn by the student on all days. Students will not be permitted in the campus without wearing identitycards.
- Conduct of the student within the classroom and in the college Premises must be Exemplary. Any serious misconduct may warrant immediate expulsion from the institution along with forfeiture of fees.
- Indulgence in any act of violence will be considered a breach of Discipline that warrants immediate expulsion from institution along with forfeiture of fees.
- Habitual negligence of your work , dishonesty, obscenity in words or actions, in subordination or such other acts of misconduct will lead toserious disciplinary actions.
- Any property damaged, due to negligence of the students, will have to be repaired/replaced by the students concerned and the expenses are to be met by them.
- Students should take care of the properties of the institute and help to keep the institute premises clean and tidy at all times. It is the responsibility of the students to keep the furniture neat and clean.
- Any debate/meeting should have the prior permission of the Principal/Vice Principal.
- The Principal/Management reserve the right to suspend/ dismiss anystudent in disciplinary ground if it is necessary for the smooth functioning of the college.
- Noncompliance with the college rules is a serious offence and will be dealt with by means of suitable fines and or appropriate disciplinary action.



- The College is under CCTV surveillance. No student is Permitted to do any harm to the equipments, it will be viewed as serious matter of concern and that will lead to disciplinary action.

## **GENERAL NORMS AND POLICIES**

- Ragging (university order No. Sw (3)/Anti -ragging/2013 dated 11/07/2013) is viewed as an unhealthy practice, a criminal offence and is strictly prohibited. If any case of ragging is reported, severe disciplinary action will be taken against those involved.
- Use of cell phones and cameras (University order No. 30115/K3/09/H Edn dated 10.02.2010) of any kind are strictly prohibited in the campus. If violated, those will be confiscated and students will be punished or levied heavy fine.
- Alcohol consumption or use of any sort of drug substances are viewed seriously and may warrant disciplinary action including suspension / dismissal from the college.
- Students shall not take part in politics or political campaigning inside the college.
- All students in the college shall cooperate with the college authorities to ensure maintenance of discipline in the college. A dignified atmosphere should be maintained in the canteen.
- New Rules & Regulations may be introduced at the discretion of the Principal/Management for proper functioning of the college.
- Students willing to avail themselves for bus concessions (KSRTC) and railway concessions, should contact the office.
- Vehicles of students will be permitted in the campus only with the vehicle pass issued from the college office. Photocopies of the license and RC book must be submitted to the office to get the vehicle pass.
- The principal will take decision for matters not covered by these regulations, and the decisions will be final.

## UG REGULATION 2014 ADMISSION ONWARDS

In compliance with the norms of University of Calicut, the students admitted to the under graduate programme have to undergo a Choice Based Credit Semester System [CUCBCSS], which includes four type of courses viz, common course, core courses, complementary courses and open courses. The duration of an under graduate programme shall be six semesters distributed in a period of three academic years. Each semester shall have a minimum of 90 working days inclusive of all examinations.

### INDIRECT GRADING SYSTEM

- Based on a 7 -point scale is used to evaluate the performance of students. Each course is evaluated by assigning marks with a letter grade (O, A+, A, B, C, D, E or F) to that course by the method of indirect grading.
- An aggregate of E grade with 40 % marks (after external and internal put together) is required in each course for the pass and also for awarding a degree. Appearance for Internal Assessment (IA) and End Semester Evaluation (ESE- external) are compulsory and no grade shall be awarded to a candidate if she/he is absent for IA/ESE or both. For a pass in each course 40% marks or E grade is necessary.
- A student who fails to secure a minimum grade for a pass in course is permitted to write the examination along with the next batch.
- After the successful completion of a semester, Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) of a student in that semester is calculated using the formula given below. For the successful completion-

- semester, a student should pass all courses.
- SGPA of the student in that semester is calculated using the formula  $SGPA = \frac{\text{Sum of the credit points of all courses in a semester}}{\text{Total credits in that semester}}$ .
  - The Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of the student is calculated at the end of a programme. The CGPA of a student determines the overall academic level of the student in a programme and is the criterion for ranking the students.
  - CGPA can be calculated by the following formula:  $CGPA = \frac{\text{Total credit points obtained in six semesters}}{\text{Total credits acquired(120)}}$ .
  - SGPA and CGPA shall be rounded off to two decimal places.
  - CGPA determines the broad academic level of the student in a programme and is the index for ranking students (in terms of grade points).
  - An overall letter grade (Cumulative Grade) for the entire programme shall be awarded to a student depending on her/ his CGPA.

**EXTERNAL EVALUATION**

External Evaluation carries 80% of marks .All question papers shall be set by the University .The external question papers may be of uniform pattern with 80/60 marks. The Courses with 2/3 credits will have an external exam of 2 hours duration with 60 marks and courses with 4/5 credits will have an external examination of 2.5 hours duration with 80 marks.

## **SOCIAL SERVICE PROGRAMME**

In this programme, a student has to complete 12 days of social service. This has to be completed in the first four semesters: 3 days in each semester. For the regular programme the student has to work in Panchayat or Local body or in a hospital, poor home or old age home or in a pain & palliative centre or any social work assigned by the college authorities. Students who are engaged in College Union activities and participate in sports and cultural activities in Zonal level have to undergo only 6 days of CUSSP during the entire programme.

## **HYGIENE**

The following stipulations are needed for a professional course.

- Daily shower and shampooing are compulsory.
- Finger nails should be cut.
- There should not be any bad odor from mouth or body.
- Wounds, if any, should be dressed properly.
- Hands should be washed properly and especially after visiting toilets.
- Daily shave is a must.
- Light cologne should be used.
- Uniform should be washed and ironed /pressed properly.
- Spitting in the public area is not allowed.
- Dropping any kind of waste materials should be done in the appropriate waste bins.
- No religious signs are allowed other than permitted by the palghat.
- No student is allowed to make any change or alteration to their given uniforms according to the trend.

The refund of the fees is governed as per stipulations given below:

- Application fee and admission fee - Not refundable
- Tuition fees - Not-refundable
- Caution Deposit - Refundable



## **YIMS SCHOLARSHIP**

YIMS has instituted the Proficiency awards for the outstanding performance in the examination conducted by the university. YIMS also given scholarships for who excel in studies and Students coming from economically backward families.

## **ISSUE OF CERTIFICATES**

Transfer certificate will be issued only after clearing all dues. Any student past or present, desirous of getting transfer or conduct certificate must apply to the Principal in the prescribed form.

## **FEE ADMINISTRATION**

- Candidates admitted to any approved course are informed about the fee collection schedule and the mode of payment. Fees are collected on annual/ semester basis.
- The fees collected from the students by the administration department by way of cash/demand draft/virtual a/c. system, and a receipt will be issued back. DD should be drawn in favor of Director, Yuvakshetra Institute of Management Studies, Ezhakkad, payable at Palakkad.
- The fees is collected before the reopening day of each semester.
- First year students cannot avail this concession, as they have to pay the full amount of the semester at the time of admission.
- The students who do not pay the fee in the stipulated time may not be allowed in the class.
- The fee defaulters are readmitted on satisfying the following conditions:
- Written application for readmission from the parent with valid reasons.
- Payment of fee dues with fine from the due date On receipt of the request for reinstatement, Principal in consultation with the Director reviews the application and takes a suitable decision. The students who wish to discontinue the course after admission
- are liable to pay the whole fees due to the College.

## **YUVAKSHETRA COLLEGE HOSTEL GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS**

- Separate hostel facility is provided for boys and girls in the college campus.
- Yuvakshetra College offers a congenial atmosphere for the integral development of its inmates. The ultimate goal is to provide a climate that can facilitate the journey towards holistic excellence.
- Hostels are considered to be the “HOME OF LOVE”.
- Admission to the hostel is restricted to the students of Yuvakshetra Institute of Management Studies (YIMS). Those who seek admission should submit the application in the prescribed form after having remitted the fees in the college office with two copies of recent passport size photograph. Admission to the hostel is given for a period of one academic year only and it has to be renewed every year.
- The policy of the college is that the student must stay either in his/her home or must stay in the hostel provided by the college.
- At the time of admission to the hostel the parent and the student should jointly give an undertaking to this effect in a prescribed format duly signed.
- All permission should be sought from the hostel warden.
- The inmates are not permitted to keep cash of more than Rs.300/- with them. If they happen to have more, they should hand over the money to the hostel warden. If any money is lost or misused, the management is not responsible for it.
- If any training programme/class/retreat/any other programme is organized for the inmates at weekend, everyone is expected to remain in the hostel to attend the same.

- Safety of belongings (mobile phones, ornaments etc) is one's own responsibility. The hostel authorities will not be responsible for any damage or loss of the same.
- Students are not allowed to entertain any visitor/day scholar inside the hostel. Students should inform the warden about their visitors and they need to meet hostel warden.
- Inmates are not supposed to remain in the hostel during class hours. Only sick persons with permission from the warden can stay back. The hostel will be closed after 9.20 AM and will be opened only after the class hours. No student is expected to be back to the hostel during class hours.
- Those who fail to attend the class or any college programme should report to the warden.
- Hostlers are not permitted to go for film, festivals, and other cultural activities without prior permission from the hostel warden.
- Perfect silence in the hostel is to be observed from 9.30PM to 8 AM.
- The warden/ director and the management reserve the right to evict any student at any time from the hostel on any disciplinary ground.
- Students are not permitted to convene meeting of any sort anywhere in the hostel premises.
- Accommodation in the boys hostel has no single room occupancy facility.
- Accommodation in the ladies hostel is limited to 60 and has no single room occupancy facility.
- An application in the prescribed format is required for admission to the hostel. Allotment of seats is strictly on first come first served basis.

- To become a bonafide hostel inmate, a refundable deposit is also to be remitted by a student besides hostel rent and other charges. This amount will be returned at the end of the course.
- Inmates have to vacate the hostel and handover the key of their rooms to the warden during long holidays and vacation. In case they wish to keep their luggage in safe custody, they may do so by using the cloak room facility.
- The inmates are individually and collectively responsible for the furniture, electrical fittings and equipments provided. Any damage to them should be reported immediately to the warden. Those responsible will have to pay for the same.
- Every occupant has to handover the inventory of the room (furniture, electrical fittings etc) to the warden while changing/vacating his/her room.
- Unauthorized furniture and electrical fittings or equipments like table fan, iron box, heater etc is not permitted. If any such item is found inside, the person responsible shall be fined and evicted from the hostel forthwith.
- All students are required to be in their rooms as per the rules of the hostel in order to strictly observe study hours and utilize it profitably. They are not permitted to loiter in other rooms/verandas unnecessarily.
- The inmates are individually and collectively responsible for the furniture, electrical fittings and equipments provided. Any damage to them should be reported immediately to the warden. Those responsible will have to pay for the same.
- Every occupant has to handover the inventory of the room (furniture, electrical fittings etc) to the warden while changing/vacating his/her room.
- Unauthorized furniture and electrical fittings or equipments like table fan, iron box, heater etc is not permitted. If any such item is found inside, the person responsible shall be fined and evicted from the hostel forthwith.

- All students are required to be in their rooms as per the rules of the hostel in order to strictly observe study hours and utilize it profitably. They are not permitted to loiter in other rooms/verandas unnecessarily.
- Hostel gates/doors shall remain closed between 9.30PM and 5.30 AM.

The administration is very strict in keeping the college hostel and campus free from the use of any intoxicants, drugs, alcohol, cigarette, unwanted magazines etc. Those found Violating this regulation shall be expelled from the College without any consideration whatsoever.

- Day scholars are not allowed to enter the hostel premises without permission.
- Students are directed not to entertain visitors in their rooms without prior permission from the Warden/Director.
- Students involved in theft, ragging, use of cigarette/alcohol etc. may be expelled from the hostel without any consideration.
- Inmates are not allowed to interchange their rooms without permission.
- Students proceeding on leave are required to inform the same to the warden in writing. Those who leave without prior sanction shall be liable to face the disciplinary action whatever it may be.
- Students proceeding on leave are required to inform the same to the warden in writing. Those who leave without prior sanction shall be liable to face the disciplinary action whatever it may be.
- Hostel rooms are not to be used for playing games. The inmates are expected to keep their rooms clean and special care is to be taken not to disfigure the walls and door with posters, scribbling etc.
- The inmates are supposed to be in proper decent attire within the hostel premises.
- Parking of vehicles is allowed only in the area provided for the purpose.

- Inmates must not remain in the hostel during the class hours. Only sick persons may stay back with valid permission from the Warden/Principal/Director.
- Students admitted to the hostel should sign a copy of the rules and regulations as having read and understood it. Disciplinary action will be taken for violation of rules and regulations and misconduct and in all matters of discipline, the decision of the Warden/Principal/Director shall be final.  
The warden shall allot rooms as per the directions from the administrative office to those secure admissions to the college.
- Each student will be provided with the essential furniture for which he/she should give an acknowledgment and for the safety of which he/she shall be responsible.
- The articles and the furniture provided shall be returned intact and a receipt shall be obtained at the time of leaving the hostel.
- Writing, sticking band and other disfiguring of the walls and rooms are strictly prohibited.
- If the college gives holidays continuously for more than five days, there will be a reduction in the mess fee.
- In cases of home visit, marriage, death, illness of close family members etc. the student has to submit letter signed by the Class Teacher/HOD to the hostel warden for the required permission.
- On public holidays with the permission of the warden students may go home.
- Hostlers going out of the campus (outing, home visit on holidays etc.) must make proper entries in the register.
- Though there is no general permission for the use of mobile phones in the campus, they can be used during the permitted hours. This use is strictly limited within the hostel.
- During the study time, if permitted, mobile phones must be used only for the purpose of study. If violated, serious action including dismissal from the campus may be taken.

- Participation in the adoration and Holy Mass from 6 to 8PM on Wednesdays and daily rosary at 7.30 PM (except on Wednesday when there is Mass) are compulsory for all the Catholic hostlers. Others also may participate.

### **STUDY HALL**

- Study time is sacred; hence it must be used effectively and carefully.
- Hostlers must study only in the study hall, not in the room or in the dormitory.
- No student is allowed to roam around in and outside the study hall.
- Study must begin at 6 pm and end at 7.30 pm. After dinner hostlers must study from 9.30 pm to 10.30 pm. No group discussion or combined study is allowed during these study hours.
- Reading newspaper, magazines, and the use of mobile phone are not allowed during study hours.
- Students can go to bed by 10.30pm but those who want, can continue their study till 11.00 pm.

### **ROOMS, DORMITORY AND FURNITURE**

- Room and dormitory are meant only for taking rest and spending sleep hours. Strict silence is to be observed in the room/dormitory.
- Keep your bed neat and tidy. Use bed cover and spread it over after night rest.
- Wet clothes should be hung in the drying room.
- Washing clothes is allowed only on specified days in the week.
- To get a no due certificate the student needs to clear all the due s before the stipulated time.

- Hostlers are expected to keep the room/dormitory, verandas toilets and hostel premises absolutely clean and tidy. They should not litter the room, lobbies or backyards with litter or throw waste through the windows or balconies. Dust bin should be used for these purposes.
- I) The inmates of the hostel should occupy only the rooms/cot allotted to them. No one should change the room/cot assigned to them without the permission of the warden. Students have to take good care of the room and furniture at their disposal and keep them clean always. No furniture should be displaced or shifted. The inmates are individually or collectively responsible for the furniture, electrical materials and pipe fitting provided. Any damage to them should be reported immediately to the warden. Those who are responsible for the damage will have to pay for it.  
II) Payments of fee dues after the due date will invite payment of a fine.
- On receipt of the request for reinstatement. Principal in consultation with the Director reviews the application and take a suitable decision. The students who wish to discontinue the course after admission are liable to pay the whole fees due to the College for the remaining course of study in lump sum for the release the original documents kept in the office.

## GOOD MANNERS

- Student should be polite in their behavior, using appropriate words and actions where ever they may be. Shouting, yelling, screaming, reading aloud and other acts which are to disturb the other inmates should be avoided by all. In public meetings and gatherings the mode of behavior should be befitting the norms of the public decency.



- Rules of modesty and decorum in dress and behavior have to be strictly adhered to. Decent dressing is expected from the hostlers even inside the campus or in the hostel premises. One is allowed to wear dhoti or lungi only inside one's rooms/ dormitories.
- Students should be polite in words and deeds to the staff, security personnel and to those who are at the service of Yuvakshetra.
- There will be a weekly evaluation done on the improvement of the grooming standards of each inmate and the report will be handed over to the college administration. The progress will be an added point considered for placement. Criteria for evaluation:  
- Punctuality, Discipline, Language, Neatness and so forth.

## **LANGUAGE**

- Medium of communication in the hostel must be English. Hostlers are directed to speak in English anywhere and everywhere.
- Punishment and fines are liable to those who do not attempt to speak in English.

## **HEALTH & SICKNESS**

- When somebody falls sick, it should be informed to the warden. If anyone takes any medicine continuously, that also has to be reported to the warden.
- It is the duty of everyone in the hostel to keep the house and the surroundings clean and healthy.
- Unnecessary visit to the sick should be avoided.
- Entry to sick room is permitted only with the consent of the warden.

## **MESS HALL, MEALS & KITCHEN**

- Food is served in the canteen or in its premises.
- Hostel fee should be remitted on or before 5th of every month.
- Mess includes breakfast, lunch, tiffin and supper.
- Reduction of the mess fee for absentees is calculated only for the continuous 5 or more holidays of the college. Other absentees are liable to pay the mess fee without any reduction.
- Students may abstain from any type of food served in the mess as a religious practice. But no substitute food will be served for them.
- The inmates of the hostel should report in time for the meals, neither early nor late.
- Students are not allowed to enter the kitchen and store room or to give instructions to the kitchen staff. Entry to the kitchen is strictly restricted to the appointed persons only. If there is any complaint, they may bring it to the notice of the warden at the earliest, directly.
- Students should take care not to waste food.
- Inmates should keep in order the tables and chairs in the mess hall. They have to wash their own plates and tumblers and they have to keep cleanliness in general.
- Conversation in the mess hall must be in a moderate voice and table etiquette is to be observed. Dining hall is not a place of recreation.
- Meals shall be served in the mess hall only during the hours fixed. No food is to be taken to the rooms and students are not permitted to bring food from outside to their rooms/ dormitory.

## **PERMISSION TO EXIT**

- Students should get permission from the warden to go out of the campus on days other than the outing days. The details are to be entered in the movement register as they go out and come back.

- Students are not permitted to go out every day. Shopping will be on fixed days. Warden is entitled to check the luggage of the Students at the time of arrival and when it is necessary.
- Everybody should be back in the hostel by 6 pm after any business. In case of any delay without reason genuine reason will be considered serious.
- Number of home visits is restricted two times every month. While returning, they should reach the hostel back on the eve of the next working day. Students who want to go home on weekend should enter their name in the register before they go to college at 9.00am Students must fill the permission slip duly signed and get permission to go home at least one day in advance.

### **SERIOUS LAPSES**

The following are considered serious lapses for which the hostlers can be asked to leave the hostel and college without prior warnings.

- Repeated absence from classes without permission.
- Serious act of dishonesty.  
Constant negative attitude towards Warden and other superiors and refusal to obey them.
- Physical violation of a person.
- Ragging or any other indecent activities.
- Viewing porn CDs or Cassettes or keeping them and similar printed materials.
- Backdoor entry into the rooms/campus.

### **PRAYER AND SPIRITUAL ACTIVITIES**

- All Christian students are expected to attend Holy Mass in the morning and Rosary in the evening every day with decent dressing.
- Every day, all Christian students should report in the chapel at 6.30 am for the Holy Mass. Others also may participate.

- Perfect silence is observed in the chapel and in the premises.
- It is advisable to be punctual and regular for daily spiritual exercises.
- Hostlers of other faith may practice yoga/meditation during the time of Holy Mass and Rosary.

### **MOBILE PHONE**

- Mobile phone is allowed in the hostel with the permission of the warden, mobile phones can be used for study purpose in the permitted hours.
- Handset should be kept in the dormitory itself at one's own risk and responsibility.
- Time allotted for the use of mobile phone is between 3.30 PM - 5.30 PM and 8.30 PM -9.30 PM.
- All inmates are expected to switch off their mobile phone from 9.30PM to 3.30 PM.
- Handsets once captured for violating any of these rules will not be returned back and it will be destroyed.
- In the ladies hostel, no individual is permitted to use their mobile phones. Instead a common phone will be given for all.
- The Tablet PC, Laptop PCs etc., can be used in the hostel premises with prior permission from Hostel Warden.
